SALUTE TO "COMMUNITY CENTERED BOARDS": THE BACKBONE OF I/DD SERVICES IN COLORADO

- 20 CCBs serve 11,000 individuals with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities across the state.
- CCCBs provide and/or fund community services activities, including family support, day and work programs, and residential supports.
- Colorado statute authorized "Community Centered Boards" in 1963 to be responsible for I/DD community services.















COLORADO'S FISCAL EFFORT FOR I/DD SERVICES IS OVER 50% BELOW THE AVERAGE U.S. STATE




COLORADO'S I/DD SERVICES FISCAL EFFORT HAS PLATEAUED SINCE 1992: FOR 36 YEARS!








